Introduction

Candidate's registered prior to October 2016 will have been issued with a paper based portfolio which was provided for them to compile their DSC2 evidence in. They will need to bring this with them when they are with you in your capacity as an Approved Witness.

The format of the paper based ICR is a little different to that used for ePortfolio, however, the Performance Criteria and Key Features remain similar.

Please be aware that as an AW, you are required to ask a candidate more questions when witnessing for a paper based portfolio than for ePortfolio.



Questions are not required for every PC, however, if the PC cannot be observed then a question or simulation might suffice depending on the PC requirement.

PC 1.1

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Carry out work safely in line with health and safety requirements	Safe working practices demonstrated. Suitable clothing worn. Appropriate safety equipment carried

You must ensure candidate compliance with health and safety throughout every part of an outing if you are to sign this PC off as achieved.

A candidate should demonstrate safe working practises at all times.

Clothing and footwear worn by the candidate should be suitable for the habitat and terrain being stalked.

You should check that a candidate is carrying appropriate basic safety equipment, suitable for the environment they are stalking in. Signal flares for example could be carried and used on the open hill but dangerous to use in thick woodland.



Determine the cull animal required	Species, sex, age group of animals that are intended to be culled

For this PC to be completed, the candidate should have a clear understanding of what their cull requirement is.

This can be achieved by a joint discussion within which you may ask a candidate a question or two. One for example might be appertaining to deer in season in relation to deer likely to be encountered in the vicinity of the stalking.

Questions asked must be recorded with the answers given.

If an animal is culled it should match the cull criteria detailed by the candidate. If a candidate is on ground other than theirs, that ground may have specific cull requirements that you would make a candidate aware of.

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Select firearm and ammunition to meet requirements of planned cull	Suitable rifle calibre and sufficient ammunition

You should check to verify that a candidate is in legal possession of a firearm they bring by checking it against the candidate's firearm certificate.

If a candidate produces a legal firearm for the deer to be stalked, there is no relevance in you asking a question such as 'why do you use that calibre'.

The PC does not call for a candidate to demonstrate knowledge of calibres or ballistics if they produce their own rifle which is legal for the species of deer in the country being stalked.

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Prepare tools, equipment and firearm into a safe and serviceable condition suitable for culling activities	Tools may include: binoculars, knives, ATV's and high seats

You should check before heading out to stalk, that sufficient equipment is carried by a candidate and that it meets the requirements for the outing about to be undertaken. As an example, you may decide that it is inappropriate to proceed if a candidate does not have a pair of serviceable binoculars or a telescope.

If the candidate is short of any essential kit such as a knife, it is permissible for you to lend a candidate one, providing they ask you. It is not for you to offer. Remember all evidence must be candidate led.

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Locate and approach deer to a distance where a safe and effective shot can be taken, taking account of the natural features of the location	Locate and approach deer taking account of the natural features of the location. Intended shot must be safe and from a reasonable distance

To achieve this PC a candidate must locate deer in their natural habitat and stalk to within a distance where an accurate, safe shot, that is within their capabilities, can be taken. You must not spot deer for a candidate or guide them to a shooting position.

If a deer is shot from a high seat, further evidence is required to satisfy the 'approach' element of this PC. In this situation, any other deer could be stalked at ground level to a point where it was standing in front of a safe backstop. The deer does need to be shot providing the candidate has stalked it taking the lead.

Waiting at a vantage point for a deer that is not subsequently stalked into is equivalent to sitting in a high seat and again, further evidence is required to satisfy the 'approach' element.

If deer are stalked and then move undisturbed by the candidate slightly back into cover before a shot can be taken, it can be permissible to wait until they re-emerge and then shoot providing a safe backstop is in place. You must take care to ensure that an animal has actually been stalked.

Thermal imaging devices

Please note the following requirements:

- For the purposes of DSC qualification, rifle mounted devices are not permitted and may not be used to complete any part of DSC 2 evidence gathering.
- Independent hand held devices may be used to recover shot (presumed dead) or wounded deer, but may not be used to locate live deer as required under PC 1.5.

Where hand held devices are used to locate shot deer witnesses should satisfy themselves that the candidate has the knowledge to be able to locate deer if such a device was defective or not available.

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Select individual deer to meet cull requirements	Selected animal meets cull criteria

In this PC you should ensure that animals meeting the cull criteria are identified to you by the candidate and are the ones being stalked.

You must be clear on which animals are in the cull plan and you may ask a candidate to identify animals more than once as the stalk progresses. If an individual animal is nominated then this must be the one that is culled unless you are informed otherwise and given reasons for the change of plan.





PC 2.1

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Handle firearm safely and efficiently according to Codes of Practice	Rifle is loaded/unloaded and handled in a safe manner. During final approach safety catch remains applied until shot is to be taken

A candidate must demonstrate safe rifle handling at all times throughout the whole of an ICR if this PC is to be signed off.

You must remain close to the candidate to ensure that the safety requirements are met and to intervene if safety is about to be compromised.





PC 2.2

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Shoot deer safely and efficiently according to location and legal requirements	Chosen shot is achieved in line with requirements. Rifle reloaded immediately

Observe that the candidate is steady and is maximising the use of any aid be it one they are carrying or another man made or natural feature such as a tree or fence post.

If practical, prior to the shot, ask the candidate where they are aiming to place the bullet. If circumstances do not allow a question at this time, ask the candidate where they aimed prior to setting off for retrieval or follow up. If the bullet strikes elsewhere question the candidate on this aspect. If the nominated shot is not achieved it is doubtful that the PC could have been.

Following the shot the correct procedures such as immediate reloading, keeping the rifle pointing in the direction of the target whilst observing it in case a second shot is required, must be followed by the candidate.

Do not encourage head shots to be taken by candidate's.





PC 2.3

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Observe reaction of deer to the shot to confirm its condition	Evaluate the situation. Is the deer: 1. Dead 2. Wounded 3. Missed. Decide on follow up according to reaction of shot deer. Position of strike and last known position of deer identified. Suitable period allowed before follow up.

You should expect a candidate to have some idea on their shot placement from the reaction of the deer and inform you of the deer's condition as detailed in the key features.

The candidate should have observed the last position of the animal and be seen to wait for a suitable time prior to following up.

You might chose to intervene during any of PCs 2.3-2.6 if a candidate shows no indication of being able to deal with a welfare issue and you would not sign off any PC affected by any such intervention.





PC 2.4

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Locate and confirm condition of shot deer	Locate using appropriate methods

You must observe that a candidate makes a careful approach and is ready to deal with a situation if an animal is wounded.

A candidate will be expected to keep checking the animal through binoculars during the approach and will take account of wind direction and other factors. You must ensure they locate a shot deer in an appropriate way.

As with any PC, you are expected to ask and record any question if appropriate and record the answers received.





PC 2.5

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Approach shot deer safely according to its presumed condition	Deer is approached with appropriate caution. Confirm whether: 1 Dead 2 Wounded. Eye blink reaction checked and appropriate action taken. Awareness of dangers from hooves and antlers.

You must observe the candidate making a cautious approach to a shot deer and checking it is dead without placing themselves or others at risk of injury from antlers or hooves.

When observing a candidate testing to confirm a deer is dead, checking for eye blink reaction with knives, rifle barrels or fingers is a safety issue and if done in this way, the PC has not been achieved.





PC 2.6

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Dispatch wounded deer humanly.	Wounded deer dispatched as conditions dictate within legal requirements

A wounded deer situation hopefully will not arise during an outing. A candidate still needs to demonstrate that they would know what to do in the event of a wounding and in most cases this PC will be covered by questions asked by you.

You must ensure that the question is relevant to test the depth of a candidate's knowledge and you must be confident that they would know how to deal with a wounded deer if required. A question such 'what would you do with a wounded deer' will not suffice. Nor will an answer from a candidate such as 'shoot it again'.

Make your questions imaginative and testing. You should remember that within a portfolio an ICR must be completed 3 times on 3 separate occasions. In relation to this PC questioning, this is likely to be the assessment method used each time so you must ask 3 different questions, one for each ICR. This principle of questioning extends across all PC's with the exception of 1.2 where it is permissible for you to ask the same question for each ICR.

PC 2.6

Except under specific circumstances, (night shooting in woodland) (Scotland) it is not a legal requirement to have a dog in attendance to recover wounded or dead deer. 'Best Practice' however, suggests that a stalker should at least have access to a suitable dog for recovery.

candidate's without a dog of their own could find themselves in a situation whereby you may have your own dog with you. Should a deer be wounded and a dog is considered by the candidate necessary for recovery, the candidate must ask you to assist with the use of your dog. You must not volunteer the use of your dog but if a candidate is clearly floundering and a wounded deer needs to be recovered, you can and should intervene by taking charge of the situation, however, if this decision is taken by you, the candidate cannot be signed off against the PC on that occasion.




PC 2.6

Performance Criteria and Key Features

There may be occasions when you are with a candidate who does wound a deer and you observe the candidate dealing with the situation correctly and humanely. Should this happen, in addition to signing the candidate off you are asked to give a brief narrative of the events in your witness notes for the ICR.

In addition to questioning a candidate, you can also create a simulation of a wounded deer situation and ask the candidate to perform the simulation under your observation. If you do, make a note of the simulation and candidate's response in your witness notes.





PC 2.7

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Confirm status of deer against cull requirements	Sex, age group and reproductive state.

You should observe the candidate checking that the animal does indeed meet the specified criteria determined under PC 1.2 and you may additionally ask appropriate questions relating to the culled animal.





PC 3.1

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Carry out work hygienically in line with food safety regulations and health and safety requirements. Ensure tools and equipment are ready for use	Cross contamination prevented. Lifting and hanging equipment serviceable and conforms to legal requirements. Candidate aware of personal lifting safety. Clean personal safety equipment serviceable and available for use (field or larder). Carcasses lifted and handled correctly.

You must observe the candidate maintaining safe practises in relation to personal safety and food safety for the duration of this element.

Such practises are equally relevant if they are conducted in the field or within the confines of a larder.





PC 3.2

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Bleed and gralloch carcase hygienically and efficiently	External inspection carried out. Cross contamination prevented by use of disposable gloves or washing. Gralloch completed in a clean area or suspended. Steps taken to prevent contamination from digestive tract

There is no specific way to carry out the gralloch nevertheless, the candidate must ensure that however the gralloch is achieved it is hygienic and carried out in such a way as to minimise contamination from every possible source.

You may be required to ask questions and record those with the answer if a candidate does not volunteer information.





PC 3.3

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Dress deer carcass ready to enter the food chain according to legal requirements.	Dress deer by removing: the head, hooves, any remaining internal organs. Avoid unnecessary contamination or damage to carcass. Unavoidable minor contamination removed.

You need to be satisfied that candidate's are able to remove head and hooves with the aid of a knife and that appropriate joints are located to facilitate this process.

Internal organs should be removed avoiding any additional carcass damage and examined competently.

Any carcass contamination must be removed in a way appropriate to the contamination. This might involve a 'single wipe' method or the use of a knife if 'cutting out' is required.





PC 3.4

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Inspect carcass, organs and lymph sites for normality according to legal requirements.	Internal inspection to include the mesenteric lymph nodes and where available the retropharyngeal and Sub-maxillary. If not available the <u>2</u> of the following lymph nodes: portal, gastric, bronchial, mediastinal. Thoracic organs, head and hooves and reproductive state inspected.

The candidate must demonstrate the ability without your help or guidance, to locate and inspect mesenteric lymph nodes and those in the head. You should not encourage head shots but if taken and lymph sites in the head cannot be identified because of shot damage then the candidate must identify 2 other sites as detailed in the key features of the PC. Choice of these sites may be left to the candidate. All internal organs are required to be inspected as are external limbs.



The candidate when dealing with a female deer must be able to determine and reveal its reproductive state to you.



PC 3.5

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Take appropriate action when carcass abnormality is identified, according to legal requirements.	Significant abnormalities located when present Candidate aware of action to take.

For the most part, abnormalities will be an uncommon occurrence. If no abnormalities are found, you must cover this PC in full by appropriate questions which fully cover the performance criteria and key features.

As always, all questions and answers must be recorded in the candidate's portfolio.






PC 3.6

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Dispose of waste from deer preparation in a safe manner according to legal requirements.	Waste disposed of appropriately, in field, or from larder. Unfit carcasses and offal identified and isolated.

You ensure that all waste is disposed of in an appropriate way which may be specific to the location. In the field the candidate must ensure that any waste is disposed of in a way that dogs or public will not come across it. In a larder the candidate will use any waste units provided or might ask how waste disposal is accommodated at that location. To answer is not considered as providing training and the fact that a candidate has asked is evidence of his ability to perform the PC to the standard required.

Any condemned carcasses or offal needs to be dealt with in a way which ensures they cannot enter the food chain. A candidate would be expected to demonstrate this or know how this would be achieved if asked a question by you.





PC 3.7

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Identify and record status of deer carcass.	Identify and record status in terms of fitness for human consumption.

The candidate is the trained hunter and the responsibility for the fitness of a carcass to enter the food chain is theirs. If they do not have a carcass tag it is permissible for you to supply one if asked for by the candidate.

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Clean and store tools and equipment after use.	Tools and equipment used in above processes cleaned and prepared for next use.

You must should ensure that all tools and equipment are cleaned and/or sterilised by the candidate's using an appropriate cleansing product.

All cleaning products must be returned to designated storage areas and facilities left ready to receive the next batch of incoming carcasses.

Where observation has not been possible, this and all other PC's must be covered by relevant questioning and recorded with answers in the candidate's portfolio





PC 4.1

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Carry out work hygienically and safely in line with food safety and with health and safety requirements.	Knives and other equipment suitable for use. Lifting and hanging equipment serviceable and conforms to legal requirements. Candidate aware of personal lifting safety and personal safety. Equipment serviceable and clean

You must observe that candidate's act safely at all times and any equipment is safe, serviceable and clean.

Where a PC cannot be directly observed it must be covered by a question which with the answer received is recorded in the candidate's portfolio.





PC 4.2

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Transport carcass in a hygienic manner to maintain its quality.	Retrieval/transport route chosen is realistic and safe. Method suitable, safe and hygienic. Carcasses and waste transported in suitable containers as appropriate. Damage or contamination to carcass minimised on route.

You must ensure that any decision is candidate lead. It is for the candidate to perhaps drag a beast from the field or hill avoiding contamination and damage. If a candidate is struggling with a load it is for him to request assistance which you may then give.

It is the candidate who must direct the loading of a carcass into a recovery vehicle or onto a pony ensuring it is in a clean condition to receive it.

Whilst you may have supplied a vehicle and will drive it, a candidate has to direct you in all you do rather than you taking control of recovery.

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Establish storage areas in a hygienic condition suitable for receiving carcasses	All necessary equipment available and safely stored. Area clean and ready to receive carcass. Storage areas suitable for purpose

When arriving at a larder, it is for the candidate to check and ensure that it is in a fit state to receive a carcass. If the larder is anything other than fit, it is for the candidate to rectify the situation which he could do by asking you to clean it if it was you who last used it.

If a larder is not used during an ICR then this element needs to be covered by asking appropriate and relevant questions and recording these and answers in a candidate's portfolio.





PC 4.4

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Store deer according to legal requirements.	Temperature, ventilation, vermin and contamination factors considered.

Candidate's should know the correct temperature to be maintained in a storage area. You should question the candidate on this matter and record all questions and answers in the candidate's portfolio.

Candidate's should be witnessed establishing that the storage area is free from contamination or in a state of disrepair which would allow insects or vermin to enter.





PC 4.5

Performance Criteria and Key Features

Performance Criteria	Key Features
Clean tools, equipment and facilities after use	Tools and equipment used in above processes cleaned and prepared for next use.

Candidate's are responsible for cleaning ready for the next intake before leaving the storage facility.

You should question and record particularly if a storage facility is not used, to ensure that the candidate demonstrates that they would know what to do in a suitable environment.



Performance Criteria	Key Features
Maintain accurate cull and larder records according to legal requirements	Maintain accurate records of: date shot, species, sex, age, reproductive status, weight, abnormalities and disposal.

You should observe candidate's maintaining accurate larder records which cover the normally required recording details.

If in an larder other than their own, a candidate would be expected to ask for the larder record book to complete entries in before leaving.

Records may be kept electronically in which case a witness might not wish anyone else to enter data. That a candidate has asked and can provide the required data is evidence that the PC has been completed. Witnesses must question and record for this PC if larder recording is not available.





Portfolio Completion

When a candidate has completed an ICR or any part of one that you have witnessed, make sure you have signed off each PC as observed, or covered it by question or simulation.

Do not hold onto a candidates portfolio for prolonged period and if you need to post it on to them, always use Recorded Delivery.

You should expect to be contacted by a candidate's Assessor who will probably ask you questions relating to your witnessing of specific PC's.

It is a good idea to keep notes of each witnessed outing to refresh your memory as it might be 3 years before you are contacted by an Assessor who will only do so when a candidate has submitted their portfolio for consideration of DSC2 award.
